The Leanyer Patch

Welcome to our Leanyer patch, we hope you have an enjoyable visit and maybe find some inspiring ideas for your own garden.

We moved into this property in July 2013 and the contrast to what it is today could not be starker. Originally it took 3.5hrs on a ride on mower to mow all the grass and there were acres and acres of coffee bush (Leucaena leucocephala) which was so thick in parts it was easy to question if you had walked onto a neighbouring property. Hundreds of loads of coffee bush went to the tip along with constant spraying of seedlings as coffee bush seeds can last over 10 years in the soil. Over the last 7+ years we have created most of what you see here today. We are still making new beds and planting out new sections each wet season. We have endeavoured to keep the top third of the block tropical around the house and the remaining two thirds predominantly native.

One of the biggest speed factors for the re-development of this garden was meeting with Emma Lupin at a Greening Australia nursery sale, she introduced us to the Land for Wildlife program which really propelled our interest and participation in the wider gardening community. Through this program we have participated in workshops and projects which have grown (pun intended) our understanding and use of native plants. Through this introduction we also were able to take part in a federal government initiative to plant trees on the property to support habitat for the black footed tree rat (a threatened species of the NT) and in December 2017 the Green Army planted approx. 500 native trees. Additionally, we are members of the Darwin City Councils Gardens for Wildlife program and have previously hosted tours and education sessions.

The introduction of natives and the many ponds and water features around the house has attracted loads of wildlife to the garden including:

- Insects there are two native beehives in the poles around the house veranda and the cicadas become deafening when they get going.
- Birds we have 3 resident pairs of bush stone curlews that nest on the block and numerous pairs of orange footed scrub foul who insist on rebuilding the mound we previously levelled. There are now 3 mounds on the go. See if you can spot them on the property as you walk around.
- Reptiles including snakes mostly pythons usually trying to eat our chooks or their eggs, frogs, and lizards (we even saw a frilled neck lizard one time) ⁽ⁱ⁾


